





Identifying When to Refer a Patient for Opioid Use Disorder Treatment

Recognizing the signs of Opioid Use Disorder (OUD) isn't always straightforward. This quick **decision guide** is designed to **help identify when someone may need additional support** and how to confidently refer them to care. Early intervention can save lives, reduce harm and open the door to long-term recovery.

Step 1: Initial Concern

Have you noticed or been informed of ANY of the following?



If yes, proceed to next step

- ☐ Recent overdose or withdrawal symptoms
- ☐ Drug-seeking behavior (frequent ER visits, lost prescriptions, etc.)
- ☐ Positive drug screen
- ☐ Criminal charges related to substance use
- ☐ Patient or their loved one expressing concern about opioid use or asking for help
- ☐ Signs of mental health crisis



If no, continue routine care but monitor for future signs

Step 2: Evaluate Substance Use Impact

Has substance use caused **ANY** of the following?

- $\hfill \square$ Missed appointments or inability to manage daily responsibilities
- ☐ Legal, financial or employment struggles
- ☐ Housing instability or family welfare involvement
- ☐ Health complications or unmanaged chronic pain
- ☐ Increased tolerance or withdrawal symptoms
- ☐ Difficulty stopping use despite negative consequences



If yes to any, proceed to referral



If unsure, consider consulting with a referring partner such as BHG





Step 3: Determine Referral Level

Is the patient in immediate crisis (overdose, suicidal, violent behavior)?

Yes



- Overdose → Call 911, administer Naloxone if available, refer to Emergency Department (ED)
- Suicidal or violent behavior → Refer to ED or crisis services





☐ **Refer to outpatient treatment** such as BHG for assessment and ongoing support

Recommend Referral to BHG If:



Patient meets ANY criteria in Steps 1 or 2



You are unsure but concerned



Patient is open to talking about treatment
